

President of Turkey Hosts Reception for the Centre



On Thursday 2 May the Centre was honoured at a special dinner, hosted at the Dolmabahçe Palace in Istanbul, by His Excellency Mr Abdullah Gül, President of the Republic of Turkey. Set directly on the Bosphorus, at the historic gateway between Western Europe and the Islamic world, the palace provided an ideal setting for the event. The guests included many of President Gül's fellow Trustees, as well as senior government officials, businessmen and scholars. They were addressed by President Gül and by the Director of the Centre.

President Gül emphasised his personal commitment to the Centre's work, which he considered of great importance in spreading a true picture of Islamic culture and civilisation to new generations in both East and West. The Director announced in cooperation with the British
