

President of Turkey lectures on 'The Islamic World, Democracy, and Development'

The President of the Republic of Turkey, HE Mr Abdullah Gül, was the Centre's Distinguished Visiting Lecturer in Michaelmas term. His Excellency delivered a lecture on 'The Islamic World, Democracy, and Development' to a capacity audience in the Examination Schools, Oxford.

President Gül stated that it was necessary to break the Islamic world's current 'deep-rooted alienation' from democracy and development, which existed despite what he termed 'the true credentials of Islamic tradition' in precisely those areas. Today democracy, human rights, good governance, and accountability were, he said, no longer a luxury but a necessity for globalization. 'We must aim at finding common ground', he concluded. In initiating dialogue with those of different faiths, 'we may easily find that some of what we hear actually is already within us.'

President Gül then answered questions from the audience on a wide range of topics, including the possibility of Turkey hosting talks with Iran in order to move towards a diplomatic solution to the dispute over Tehran's nuclear programme. As world power shifts eastwards, he said, the EU would find a growing necessity to ad-

To mark the Centre's twenty-fifth anniversary, the Vice-Chancellor inaugurated a special exhibition which the Centre staged in collaboration with Oxford's Museum of the History of Science.

The purpose of the exhibition, titled 'Al-Mizan', is to explore the connections between the sciences and arts in early Muslim societies. It concentrates on the manner in which craftsmen combined scientific inquiry and artistic beauty to create a range of sophisticated instruments that are both attractive and functional. To do so the exhibition gathers together pieces not only from the museum's own extensive collection of scientific apparatus, but also items from other important collections in the Ashmolean Museum, the Bodleian Library, the Khalili collection, and the British Museum.

The exhibition, which runs from October through March, is accompanied by a series of public lectures, table talks, workshops, tours, and other events.

Centre marks 40th Anniversary of the Accession of HM Sultan Qaboos

This autumn the Centre marked the fortieth anniversary of His Majesty Sultan Qaboos bin Said's accession to the Throne of Oman.

The Secretary General of the Foreign Ministry of Oman, HE Sayyid Badr bin Hamad Albusaidi, was invited to the Centre in October. During his visit, His Excellency conducted a seminar on the subject of 'International Relations in the Era of a New Asia'. He described the Omani perception of the China's and India's influence within both the immediate region and the global economy.

During the course of his talk, His Excellency described Oman's stance on the rise of Asia as being largely benign and welcoming, and encouraged Western governments to acknowledge other countries' views in this regard when formulating policy.

The seminar was attended by scholars from Oxford University and other institutions, who shared their perspectives on a broad range of related topics.

The Secretary General was accompanied by HE Mr Abdulaziz bin Abdullah al Hinai, the ambassador of the Sultanate of Oman to the UK. During their visit they inspected the new building and discussed areas of mutual interest between Oman and the Centre.

HE Dr Rawya Saud Al Busaidi, Minister of Higher Education for the Sultanate of Oman,

invited the Director and the Centre's Sultan of Oman Fellow, Professor Francis Robinson, to attend a symposium in Muscat, titled 'The Academic Chairs of His Majesty Sultan Qaboos and their Contribution to the Development of Human Knowledge'.

The symposium, which took place in November, focused on the fourteen academic posts that have been endowed by HM Sultan Qaboos in institutions around the world. These posts address subjects within the fields of Oriental studies, international relations, applied sciences, and human-resource development.

Seminars series on Islam and geography

The Centre held a series of seminars during Michaelmas Term, in honour of Dr David Browning, OCIS Registrar, who recently retired (see OCIS News no. 54). These seminars took as their starting point Dr Browning's distinguished career as a geographer at Oxford University, and focused on placing various aspects of Islamic culture in a geographical context.

Seminar speakers included Professor Maria Logrono (Florida International University) on 'Being Muslim in Latin America'; Professor Paulo Pinto (Fluminense Federal University, Rio de Janeiro) on 'Muslims in South America: The Case of Brazil'; and Dr Emma Clark (The Prince's School of Traditional Arts) on 'The Islamic Garden: An Opportunity for Bridge-Building between Cultures'.

Dr Mona Hassan (Duke University) spoke on 'Recalling Baghdad's Sacred Geography'; Professor Diarmaid MacCulloch (St Cross College, Oxford) on 'Christianity and Islam: Way-Stations on a Journey'; Dr Sophie Gilliat-Ray (Cardiff University) on 'Muslims in Britain: Past, Present, and Future'; and Lieutenant Commander (Ret'd) Gavin Menzies (London) on 'Did Zheng He Map the World by 1418?'.

Higher Education Academy Workshop on Islamic Studies

In December the Centre hosted a Regional Workshop on the teaching of Islamic studies in the south of England.

Organized in conjunction with the Higher Education Academy's Islamic Studies Network, the day-long workshop focused on current teaching and research, as well as cross-disciplinary collaboration within Islamic studies. Professor Francis Robinson (OCIS) gave the opening address.

The morning session, chaired by Professor M.A. S. Abdel Haleem (SOAS), offered participants the opportunity to share their teaching materials and course or module outlines. After lunch, a panel discussion chaired by Dr Carool Kersten (King's College London) and Dr Mohammed Talib (OCIS) explored ways in which different academic fields could be combined to enhance approaches to teaching Islamic studies.

Centre Fellow appointed as a Privy Councillor

Dr Afifi Al-Akiti, KFAS Fellow in Islamic Studies and Islamic Centre Lecturer in the Faculty of Theology, has been appointed as a Privy Councillor to the State of Perak, Malaysia.

The Council's duties include advising on the exercise of prerogative powers assigned to its constitutional monarch, the Sultan of Perak, in matters pertaining to Islamic and Malay custom.

In his welcoming address, the Ambassador praised the Centre's remarkable growth and academic reach, which he described as being increasingly vital in order to build bridges and defuse tensions between different cultures and faiths.

In his reply, the Director thanked those present for their steadfast support throughout the Centre's formative years. He added that although an anniversary of only a quarter-century might appear small by Oxford standards, those years had served to place the Centre on a solid foundation from which its work could flourish.
