

Inaugural Lecture Series Sir John Major speaks on 'A World Adrift'

The Centre was delighted to welcome The Rt Hon Sir John Major KG CH who delivered a lecture on Monday 21st November to launch the Centre's inaugural year of special events in the new building. Sir John took as his title 'A World Adriff' and a capacity audience attended the Malaysia Auditorium to hear his insights and commentary on recent international events and the challenges and opportunities the international community now face.

Sir John depicted a world in transition and confronting many risks. If the United Nations had failed to live up to all the hopes of its founders, that was a reason to strengthen support for its role, not to abandon it. He called for enhanced international cooperation, and the need to hear more from diplomats rather than demagogues, but also for determination in facing down challenges.

In his survey of international affairs, which encompassed the turmoil in the Middle East, East/West relations, BREXIT and many other issues, he cautioned against believing that there was a ready solution available to political leaders to solve every problem. In this ever more complex world it was more likely that every solution would bring its own accompanying problems. But with intelligence and statesmanship he was confident progress could be made.

Sir John also engaged in a lively question and answer session with the audience of academics. students, diplomats and other invited guests. The future of the UK's relationship with

the European Union,

and particularly the implications for institutions of higher education and research, such as Oxford, were high on the agenda. The Vote of Thanks was given by Professor Louise Richardson, the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Oxford. The Director hosted a dinner in honour of Sir John in the Oman Hall following the lecture.

International Jury announces winners of Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah Prize in Islamic Finance

It was the unanimous decision of an international jury to award the 2016 Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah International Prize in Islamic Finance to the Islamic Development Bank as an institution and to HE Dr Ahmad Mohamed Ali in view of his outstanding personal contribution.

The Islamic Development Bank is the world's leading



international Islamic finance institution, established in 1975 to foster the economic development and social progress of its 56 members spread over four continents. The bank provides loans and grants to finance productive activities in key economic sectors. It operates on Islamic principles and provides assistance to Muslim communities in non-member countries, supporting the activities of the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation and its affiliated institutions.

HE Dr Ahmad Mohamed Ali, who retired recently, was the founding President of the Islamic Development Bank and led the bank for over thirty years. His leadership was instrumental for the institutional development of the bank and the realization of its mission.

The Centre's International Academic Advisory Committee met in Oxford on 22nd November. This Committee brings together an international group of eminent scholars, diplomats and public figures who advise the Centre on its academic policies and in particular its cooperation with scholarly institutions around the world. At this meeting the committee focussed on the new opportunities provided by the facilities now available in the new building of the Centre and how they can help expand international partnerships.

Eighth SC-OCIS Roundtable on Creating Shared Values Through Sharing Risk

The Centre hosted its Eighth joint Round Table on Islamic Finance with the Securities Commission Malaysia at Ditchley Park, Oxfordshire on 25th-26th March. The keynote address was delivered by HRH Sultan Nazrin Shah, who was also guest of honour at a gala dinner hosted at the Wallace Collection in London and attended by senior guests from the world of business and finance. Conference participants continued

their discussions over the weekend, focussing in particular on the benefit to wider society of financial instruments providing for risksharing between the contracting parties which can also prevent abuses from developing.

This annual event, bringing together regulators, practitioners and scholars from around the world, is of growing importance and a leading element of the Centre's efforts to promote academic focus on Islamic finance.

Lord Dyson delivers Azlan Shah Lecture on Religion and the Law

The Rt Hon Lord Dyson, until recently Master of the Rolls, gave the Azlan Shah lecture on 'Religion and Law: Some Current Problems' at the Centre on Wednesday 23rd November

2016. The Director introduced the lecture and the session was moderated by the Warden of Wadham College, and former Director of Public Prosecutions, Lord Macdonald, who also proposed the vote of thanks. The lecture, and subsequent question and answer session, illuminated many themes of legal, ethical and moral importance, with reference to judgements of the English and European courts, relevant to religious custom and practice. This lecture fell within the special series under the auspices of the Centre's Sultan Azlan Shah Fellowship, the first in that series to be delivered in the new auditorium and was a further step in developing the Centre's activities in the field of law.

Ambassador Idriss Jazairy speaks on The Heritage of Emir Abd el Kader

On 15th February Dr Idriss Al Jazairy delivered a lecture on the legacy of the Algerian scholar and resistance hero, Abdul Kader Al Jazairy. Ambassador Al Jazairy, Director General of the Geneva Centre for Human Rights Advancement and Global Dialogue, and a United Nations Special Rapporteur, examined the history and writings of Emir Abdul Kader, arguing that the extent to which he pioneered, in both theory and practice, concepts of human rights in

armed conflict show that these are not, often believed, as solely European а achievement. Muslim World, and particularly the Emir himself, have left a rich heritage in this respect.

The group also discussed "Understanding Islam and Muslims" in a worskhop with the Centre's KFAS Fellow, Dr Afifi Al-Akiti, which stimulated much discussion and was warmly appreciated.

Project on Muslims in Britain

The Centre's Muslims in Britain Project has developed further in recent months, with the award to Professor Mark Halstead, Azman Hashim Fellow, of a research grant from the British Academy to undertake research on 'Muslims in Bradford'.

Dr Asma Mustafa, Salahuddin Abdul Jawad Research Fellow, continues her British Academy supported research project on Muslims in the Armed Forces.

A fortnightly roundtable has attracted wide participation within Oxford and is a valued new activity.

UNESCO Director General launches multi volume History of Islamic Culture

On Monday 27th March the Centre hosted the Director General of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation, Ms Irina Bokova, for the launch in the United Kingdom of UNESCO's "Different Aspects of Islamic Culture" collection. The publication of the final two volumes of this collection brings to a successful conclusion a collaboration involving more than 150 scholars worldwide. In her keynote speech, the Director General declared "the Collection is testimony to the power of knowledge and culture to bring people together in the search for truth". She also paid tribute to the Centre's role in promoting international academic cooperation.

To mark this important intellectual milestone, the Centre invited senior scholars to take part in a panel discussion entitled "Common Heritage and Cultural Diversity in Muslim Societies: Understanding the Past, Building the Future". Participants included Dr Abdulrahim Ali Mohamed (International University of Africa and an editor for the UNESCO Collection), Professor Marcia Hermansen (Loyola

University), Professor Carole Hillenbrand (Edinburgh University), and Professor Bruce Lawrence (Duke University). A lively discussion ensued with an audience of scholars and students, as well as the Centre's invited guests.
